DUAL DEGREE DR.OT/PH.D. PROGRAM

2ND ANNUAL DR.OT CAPSTONE CONSORTIUM

The 2nd Annual Dr. OT Capstone Consortium took place March 8, 2024, providing a forum for the Dr.OT students to share their capstone projects at various phases, working with faculty, fellow students, alumni, and community occupational therapists to brainstorm ideas for the practice scholarship-focused projects. Brainstorming together to enhance occupational therapy!!

The OTD program at the Tampa Bay Regional Campus held its annual retreat on February 14, 2024 to discuss operational and educational topics for the future. All faculty, professional administrative staff, the department chair and program director attended the full day retreat, held at the Tampa Bay Regional Campus. As an icebreaker, we randomly divided into three groups to assemble our assigned puzzles. This activity required the group members to work together, and later with the other two groups when we figured out that some puzzle pieces were missing, and that they were mixed with the pieces of the other two groups. We all had fun, while working together as a group.

The retreat covered both administrative and teaching topics which we prioritized before the session. We revisited the course sequences, especially the research courses to clarify expectations from each of the seven sequences. We also discussed maintaining rigor without overloading the students, the need for communication between and among instructors.

We also discussed the final fall term of graduating students, which include the three doctoral transformation courses, the doctoral certification and capstone and research dissemination courses. We also discussed outcomes documentation for accreditation and institutional purposes like annual and interim reports, reaccreditation in ten years, ASLO, etc. We clarified some policies including attendance and professional behaviors, community service partnerships, and finalized the program's blended presence policy. Quite a list we had, but we knew that we would have to continue discussing items covered, including updating the program's strategic plan. 



PhD PD CORNER



Rick Davenport, Ph.D., OTR/L Associate Professor and Director, Ph.D. Program in Occupational Therapy

Currently, as of this Summer 2024 semester, we will have 42 Ph.D. occupational therapy students in our program. Over 20 of these Ph.D. students are in their dissertation process and are at various stages of completing their dissertation projects. We are looking forward to these 20 Ph.D. students disseminating their dissertation projects and adding to the OT profession's knowledge base. Along these lines, I am delighted to announce that, while in the preliminary discussion stages, we are in the process of developing an Entry-Level OTD to Ph.D. Transition Pathway here at NSU. One of the goals of the Entry-Level OTD to Ph.D. transition pathway will be to train new therapists earlier in their career to conduct research, thus having the skill set to add to the OT profession's knowledge base.

Of note, recently, during our Winter semester (Jan. – Apr. 2024), we concurrently held both our 2-day Ph.D. Winter Midsession and 4-day Ph.D. Winter Research Institute. We welcomed six Ph.D. students to our Fort Lauderdale, Florida campus on March 7-10, 2024, for the Midsession and Research Institute. The Ph.D. students traveled from across the U.S., including Arizona, Florida, Iowa, Ohio, and Texas. During the 2-day Ph.D. Midsession students participated in lectures on the IRB process & procedures, dissertation writing, library database searches, etc. Ph.D. students were able to meet and have discussions with both our College Dean, Dr. Wilson, and our Occupational Therapy Department Chair – Dr. Pinchevsky-Font. Additionally, Ph.D. students had multiple scheduled sessions over the 2-days to interact with faculty to discuss their dissertation ideas as well as hear from potential dissertation chairs regarding tips for being successful in completing their dissertation project. The students enjoyed getting to know the NSU Fort Lauderdale campus as they had a walking tour, some of the places they toured included the Don Taft University Center, Alvin Sherman Library, NSU Bookstore, and HPD Library. The Ph.D. students also enjoyed attending the multiple Zoom sessions where Ph.D. OT alumni & current Ph.D. students had a dialogue regarding their OT Ph.D. alumni/current experiences in the program. During the 4-day Ph.D. Winter Research Institute students were on campus March 7-10, 2024, as part of the PCHCS collegewide shared research courses. Our OT students joined Speech-Language Pathology students. The students had intensive four full days of Quantitative & Qualitative Research Design content. During these courses, the students were able to perform mock interviews with 3 undergraduate NSU students, transcribe the individual interviews, code, and present their data analysis. Finally, our 6 Ph.D. students from both the Midsession and Research Institute were able to attend our 10th Annual Reba L. Anderson Memorial Lecture, where Dr. Penny Moyers-Cleveland gave a wonderful presentation titled "When AI is My Copilot: Change in The Meaning, Form, & Function of Occupation".
