Welcome to our new digital Post-Professional Ph.D. and Dr.OT newsletter! Over the past 7 years, I have had the pleasure of serving as the Program Director for the Ph.D. in Occupational Therapy Program. I am delighted to announce this Fall 2023 semester, we will have 42 Ph.D. occupational therapy students in our program. This milestone has been due to the dedication and ingenuity of our faculty as well as the perseverance and commitment of our Ph.D. students. The ingenuity can be seen in the exciting and innovative dissertation projects our students are currently completing. I invite you to view page 9 of the newsletter where we list some of the innovative dissertations being completed by 15 of our current Ph.D. students. As you may know, our Ph.D. Program prides itself on meeting the needs of our students. As a result, I would like to highlight three exciting new student-centric changes that we have recently made.

-**Multi-point entry.** Historically we have accepted students only once per year (Fall semester). However, as of the Winter semester of 2023, we began accepting Ph.D. students three times per year (e.g., Fall, Winter Summer). By adding two additional start dates in the year, we are able to accommodate student entry-term needs. As a result, since implementation, we have admitted 1 Ph.D. student Win. & 2 in the Summer of 2023.

-**Decrease in the required number of student trips to campus.** Previously Ph.D. students were required to travel to campus (for 2-4 days) multiple times each didactic year. However, as of the Winter semester of 2023, we decreased the frequency of trips required to travel to campus to only two times during the entire curriculum. We also no longer require students to come to campus to defend their dissertations. This decrease in the number of on-campus requirements reduces the travel burden on students.

-**OCT 7101 – Updated – Health Professional as Academic Educator Course** We have updated the Academic Educator course by threading a subject-centered integrative learning model approach. The rationale for this update is to stay current and competitive by integrating needed content (e.g., occupation-centered education) into the upcoming Fall 2023 course.

I am truly grateful and proud of all our current students, alumni, faculty, and staff who strengthen our Ph.D. Program presence, and recognition every day, while advancing our profession.

WINTER MIDSESSION

The Ph.D. Program welcomed ten Ph.D. students to our Fort Lauderdale, Florida campus on March 8-9, 2023, for the Ph.D. Program Winter Semester Midsession. The Ph.D. students traveled from across the U.S. including Florida, Illinois, Maryland, New Jersey, North Carolina, and Ohio, as well as internationally from as far away as Qatar. Over the 2-day Ph.D. Midsession students participated in lectures on sample size estimation & power, library database searches, IRB process & procedures, and dissertation writing tips.

On the first day, Ph.D. students were able to meet our College Dean – Dr. Nehrenz, and our Occupational Therapy Department Chair – Dr. Pinchevsky-Font.

Later, Ph.D. students had lunch with fellow Ph.D. students from the Physical Therapy Ph.D. Program that were also on campus for their Ph.D. Midsession. On the second day, Ph.D. students were able to meet and have a 1.5 hour lunch with the Fort Lauderdale Faculty and staff. The students enjoyed getting to know the NSU Fort Lauderdale campus as they had a walking tour, some of the places they toured included the Don Taft University Center, Alvin Sherman Library, NSU Bookstore, and HPD Library.

The Ph.D. students had multiple scheduled sessions over the 2-days to interact with faculty to discuss their dissertation ideas as well as hear from potential dissertation chairs regarding tips for being successful in completing their dissertation project. Finally, on the last day, the Ph.D. students attended a Zoom session where 5 Ph.D. OT alumni from across the U.S. including Arizona, Georgia, New York, and Ohio, as well as internationally from India. I am a 2018 graduate of the Florida A&M University's Master of Occupational Therapy program. I have almost five years of clinical experience in a variety of setting including pediatrics to older adults. In 2020, I was awarded the Florida Occupational Therapy Education Consortium's (FLOTEC) Fieldwork Educator of the Year. I am certified in kinesiotaping for both postural alignment and pain management techniques to improve occupational performance. I began my career in pediatrics and was a school-based and early intervention (EI) practitioner for three years before making the shift to outpatient adults and then eventually working in SNF/IPR.

I chose Nova Southeastern University because of its history and its mission statement. The student centered learning was appealing, and it was the most logical choice for me to make. The program has shaped me as a clinician in many ways. The most significant was the focus on occupation-based practice. She is working as the director of rehabilitation therapies for Mental Health and Substance Abuse Treatment Services within the Minnesota Department of Human Services Direct Care and Treatment division. Before her role with the state in 2019, Claire worked as the primary occupational therapist in an inpatient substance use disorder treatment program for eight years.
